In the case of sub-aqueous contours it is customary to indicate different depths by characteristic lines, a special form of line being used to designate each depth shown. The forms commonly used in drawing lines of equal depth are as follows: For the shallowest contour: . --For the contour next in depth: For the contour next in depth: and so on for successive contours. In addition to such details as have been described, the direction of the current is shown by an arrow and the directions of true and magnetic north are shown by suitable symbols.
